A pillow case. It has to be soft and able to go in the washing machine.

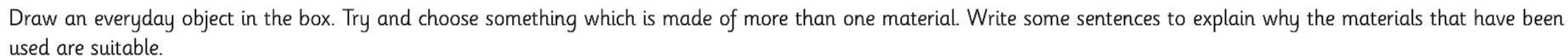


A vase. It has to hold flowers and look pretty.
